



Declaración



The PLACJC¹ and DCJ², gathered in Bogotá, Colombia, between May 22 and 26, 2023, at the Regional Assembly on Climate Justice for Latin America and the Caribbean, given the critical moment that the climate crisis currently represents we:

- Reaffirm our conviction that the climate and civilization crisis have systemic origins that are structurally anchored in capitalism, extractivism, colonialism, developmentalism, racism, anthropocentrism, the exploitation of workers, and patriarchy.
- Renew our commitment to work and fight in alignment and solidarity with other organizations and social movements against predatory extractivism and all the false solutions promoted by corporations and governments; as well as promoting and making visible the alternatives built by communities on the ground.
- Reiterate the right of people to effective participation in real and fair solutions to climate change, such as leaving coal, oil, and gas underground, ending the agro-industrial model and eliminating large-scale mining.
- Express our deep distrust of the UNFCCC negotiation spaces, which have become, through corporate capture and the complicity of governments, a farce which perpetuate the unfair and predatory system through false solutions such as offsets, carbon markets, geoengineering and a political-corporate technocracy developed in the interest of multinational corporations, among others.

We call for:

- Organizations and social movements of Latin America and the Caribbean to join us in the fight for climate justice and social justice, from the ground up, in defense of human rights and nature;
- People and institutions within the fields of science, education, public policy and the press to abandon the hegemonic discourse of 'collapse and technocracy' that prevents progress in the creation and consolidation of the conscious and active majorities for the structural transformations required by systemic change and overcoming the climate crisis;
- Women's, decolonial, grassroots, community and southern feminist organizations to join with us in the fight for climate justice.

Finally, we express our full support to the Ecuadorian organizations and movements, in their struggle to definitively keep oil underground in block 43 of the Yasuní National Park in the national referendum on August 20th.
